Djiringanj, Thaua and Dhurga are Aboriginal languages of the Far South Coast.

## **EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM**

Reconciliation Week: We embed Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander perspectives throughout our educational program and work in partnership with Djiringanj Elders who are generous with their time, sharing knowledge and culture with us. Each week we acknowledge the Djiringanj people. Children learn that Aboriginal people are the first people to live in Australia and that Tathra (land of the quoll) is Djiringanj Country. Djiringanj, Thaua and Dhurga words are part our

daily program. As we tap our 'Gurrungan" (head); shrug our Waadi (shoulders); tap our "Ngumu"

(Knees) and tickle our Niyaan (Toes). We care for Country. We learn to listen to each other, use kind works and practice strategies for kindness and respect.

<u>Reconciliation walk</u> It was great to see so many families at Reconciliation Walk. It was a beautiful community day with children, families and Djiringanj elders.

# Emotions and social learning This term we used "The Colour Monster" as a springboard to help child identify

emotions and develop strategies for regulating big emotions.

We explored these themes through:

- art and self-portrait.
- mathematical concepts of sorting and colour;
- music and dance and
- o physical activity.

Ask children to teach you sign language for angry, sad and

happy. <u>Resilient Kids Toolkit - Royal Far West</u> has some great resources and tools for families and children to strengthen mental health and build resilience.

Imaginative Play: The Preschool hospital has been a hive of activity. The light table provides the perfect x-ray machine and the opportunity to learn about bones. Children are learning about the respiratory, circulatory and digestive systems. When children engage in pretend play they are actively experimenting with the social and emotional roles of life. Children confidence as they explore the different roles in imaginative play. They learn about turn-taking, sharing responsibility and creative problem-solving. When children pretend to be different characters, they have the experience of 'walking in someone else's shoes', which helps teach empathy. At this age children often see the world from their own egocentric point of view; through maturation and cooperative play children begin to understand the feelings of others.

<u>Growing Project</u>: Children set up the veggie garden beds by improving the soil with our compost from the tumblers and worm farm. Like every good scientist we hypothesise, observe, measure and document our findings. Children use rulers to measure and a graph to chart the growth. The tools of measurement and documentation provide children with hands on mathematical learning and science of growing our own veggies.







<u>Literacy</u>: This term we have had fun rhyming with lots of stories, rhymes and poems. Hearing and using rhyme, rhythm and repetition helps children develop early literacy skills. The repetition of words, ideas and skills is important for early brain development, as it creates secure foundations for early learning.

Maths is everywhere: Playing games with dice and spinners; measuring plant growth and rainfall; counting to 10 and beyond; counting back from 10; creating sums, recognising and writing numerals and organising patients in the hospital with a numbering system are all part of our preschool day. Pattern making has been a focus this term. When children explore and learn about patterns, we help them build important foundations for later number work. Creating, extending, naming, and talking about patterns help build strong mathematicians.


